The stripping of the Altar

After the stripping of the Altar, the congregation leaves in silence.

Features of Tonight's Service: The service this evening begins with the Invocation, Confession and Absolution, and then we will sing the first hymn where we customarily speak or chant the Introit. In the liturgy of the church from ancient times, the Confession and Absolution were actually done separately, even at other times of the week, and the actual Communion service would start without it. Thus, the "Introit," which means "Entrance Hymn," would be the first thing to take place in the worship service. Since having no printed "Introit" for this evening as is our usual custom, we are using the first hymn as this "Entrance Hymn" after the Confession and Absolution. You may have noticed in our usual Sunday services that pastor and vicar will remain on the chancel floor until the "Introit" or "Entrance Hymn" as a further illustration of this practice. Our sins separate us from God. Because of the Absolution (forgiveness given us by God) are we thus able to "enter," at God's invitation, into God's presence. The stripping of the altar is an ancient custom that reminds us of Christ being stripped of everything at the end of His earthly ministry when He was arrested and executed for our sins. The altar area of the church is a place that symbolizes for us the presence of God in our midst.

Why is there no blessing? The services which take place on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday are taken as a unit. They are really one big remembrance and celebration. For this reason, the blessing is omitted on both Maundy Thursday and Good Friday because the service doesn't actually end until the Benediction on Easter Morning.
