From Pastor McPike's Desk.....

I do not like the word "passed" in any of the forms it is used to describe someone who has died. Yet these have become very popular. "Passed." "Passed on." "Passed away." I have never liked it, because it is an attempt to deny the reality of what has happened. At any number of bereavement conferences I have attended, presenters have said, "Do not be afraid of the 'D' word."

In July, I attended a conference at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis titled "Dying Well in Christ." The first presenter called out this very popular trend of using "Passed" in various forms and indicated that it is because we fear death. By nature, we tend toward a fear of death, don't we? Death is that final threat to us that stands before us as the barrier from which we cannot return. It separates us from our earthly journey. It breaks apart relationships. If there is anything that is final in this life, it is death.

"Passed" in its various forms has become popular because it allows us to avoid "the 'D' word", and thus, the harsh reality of that which we fear. We should, however, not fear death. Every Easter, yes, even every Sunday, we celebrate how we do not fear death because our brother, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, came to this earth, faced death in our place, and rose victoriously to announce His defeat of death. Jesus did not "pass". He did not "avoid the inevitable." Jesus died. And Jesus rose again.

This is why we gather in the church for a funeral. Funeral services are not simply celebrations of someone's life. They celebrate Christ's life, death and resurrection from the dead that now gives us hope in the face of death. With St. Paul, we do not hide behind the reality of death saying the person "passed". Rather, with the apostle, "We believe that Jesus died and rose again. And so we believe that that God will bring with Jesus those who have died believing in Him." (1 Thess 4:14).

Christians, then, do not gather at the church simply to "say goodbye." We do not gather to "celebrate life" as in celebrate the "life that was." We do gather to grieve, but not as those who have no hope. Our grief is for the separation, the tearing away from us that has happened in the death of those who are now parted from this life and await us in eternity. Our grief comes from the reality that someone beloved to us is no longer on this earth, no longer is available to share this life with us here in time. But, as St. Paul reminds us, "we do not grieve as those who have no hope." Death is real. But

death is defeated. As we also confess to the world at each and every gathering at the grave, "<u>Death has been swallowed up in victory.</u>" Funerals certainly celebrate life, but more than that. Funerals celebrate victory! Funerals celebrate life because Christ has defeated death. Funerals celebrate the life of Christ, the love of Christ, and the joy that we have that our loved one, having died in the waters of baptism, having now died in this life, will never die again. We celebrate lives lived and lives in heaven.

An absolutely amazing Christian hymn that is more than perfect for every funeral confesses this truth, especially in the last stanza:

Lord, let at last Thine angels come, To Abram's bosom bear me home That I may die unfearing;

And, in its narrow chamber keep, my body safe in peaceful sleep,

Until Thy reappearing.

And then from death awaken me, that these my eyes with joy may see,

Oh Son of God, Thy glorious grace, my Savior and my fount of grace!

Lord Jesus Christ, My prayer attend, My prayer attend.

And I will praise Thee without end!

(LSB 708:3) "Lord, Thee I Love with All My Heart"

We need not attempt to "pass" death. Jesus FACED death, defeated death, and thus has taken the sting from death. "I know that my redeemer lives"!

We at Osman have a privilege of gathering every Sunday for a "Celebration of Life". We celebrate the life of our Savior, who gave His life only to take it up again, defeating death. We further, every Sunday, celebrate life when we come forward to partake of the body and blood of Christ in the bread and the wine. Holy Communion is truly a "celebration of life". We receive the actual life of Christ in His body and blood, giving us power to live today and assuring us of rescue from death when our great God calls us from this life.


Operation Christmas Child



We will be packing shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child in November for children in poor countries across the world. Since school supplies are on sale NOW, this would be a good time to purchase needed items. We are in need of 8 glue sticks, 7 pencil sharpeners, 24 boxes of crayons, 58 pencils, 24 bars of soap, 23 boxes of markers (10-12 packs), 17 boxes of colored pencils, 14 wash cloths, 17 nail clippers, and 23 individual packages of Kleenex, We usually pack 12 boxes for boys and 12 boxes for girls so other

small items such as Match Box cars, hair slips, bracelets, or sunglasses may be added. If you prefer to give a cash donation, we would be glad to buy items that are needed. There will be a collection box on the last pew by the balcony stairs. Two Thrivent Action Team cards will be used to buy larger items and to pay the \$10 postage fee (maybe more) for each box. Poles Removed





During the first week of July the wooden poles on the church property that parallels the railroad tracks were removed.
