

In Autumn, we naturally think of change. Leaves change colors and fall to the ground. Our wardrobe changes as warm summer breezes give way to brisk autumn winds. Clocks change back to "regular time." The days grow shorter and the nights longer.

### **Reformation**

Within the Lutheran Church, Reformation Day is officially referred to as THE FESTIVAL OF THE REFORMATION. Until the 20th century, most Lutheran churches celebrated Reformation Day on October 31st, regardless of which day of the week it occurred. Today, most Lutheran churches transfer the festival on or before October 31st. The liturgical color of the day is red, which represents the Holy spirit and the Martyrs of the Christian Church. Luther's hymn "A Mighty Fortress is Our God" is traditionally sung on this day. The Reformation will be celebrated in our regular worship service on Sunday, October 19th.

### **Church Council**

The church council will meet on Wednesday, October 15th, at 6:30 in the fellowship hall. There will also be a Quarterly Congregational Meeting on Sunday, October 19th after the worship service.

### **Fall Festival**

### **Ladies Aid/LWML Meeting**

Six ladies met on September 11th for the Ladies Aid/LWML meeting at 7 PM in the fellowship hall. The common table prayer was recited before delicious refreshments were served by Wilma Grussing and Diana Zimmerman. After the meeting was called to order, the LWML Pledge was recited. Brenda Hendricks led a topic on the many different gifts that God has given us as prepared by Debbie Lammle. Roll call was answered by a Bible verse on harvest. The minutes of the July meeting were read and approved. The mites were collected, and President Hendricks led a mite prayer on the grant for helping Ukraine's orphans and displaced persons. The treasurer's report was given which showed a balance of \$2852.18. It was reported that 80 quilts have been completed as of the time of the meeting with one more quilting date scheduled before they are shipped. Both Lutheran World Relief and Orphan Grain Train quilts will be delivered to pick-up locations in late October.

In the old business President Hendricks thanked Debbie Lammle and Debbie Martin for organizing the August luncheon which was held in Loda at Murdocks. 14 members and friends attended and shared great food and fellowship. She thanked all the ladies who helped make food, serve food, and did various other duties for the Danville Zone Rally which we hosted on September 9<sup>th</sup>.

In new business the group was informed of our newly adopted Seminary student, who is Johnathan Bernau who is from the Central Illinois District. The group will give \$85 per month for the 9 months of his school year. President Hendricks also shared a letter from the Seminary Student Adoption Program informing us that the changes that were to be made with our student aid donation (Deducting 2% of our donation to help with administrative costs) has been reconsidered so all of our donation will help the student. The group voted to give \$250 to Lutheran World Relief for the shipping costs for the quilts. LWML Sunday was discussed. Members signed up for greeters and readers with arrangements made to decorate the church with quilts and dresses, design a bulletin board about our organization, and place flowers on the altar on LWML Sunday on October 5<sup>th</sup>. Upcoming election of officers was announced. Each member received a slip of paper to fill out on what positions they would like to be elected for. The forms need to be returned to the nominating committee by October 31<sup>st</sup> and they will make up the ballot for the November meeting. The next meeting will be held on November 13<sup>th</sup> at 1:30 PM. The topic will be given by Marsha Warsaw, and the hostesses will be Debbie Lammle and Sue Van Wakeman. Roll call will be answered on a Bible verse on showing thanks.

### **Summary of the September Council Meeting**

Nine elected church officers attended the meeting on September 17<sup>th</sup>. The meeting began with a reading from Jeremiah 23:16-29 by Pastor McPike, followed by prayer. Debbie Lammle read the minutes from the last council meeting. With no corrections, the minutes were approved as read. The treasurer's report was read with a balance of \$48,758.94 as of the end of the month. Total expenses for August were \$8,075.41 and total income was \$13,126.80. Treasurer's report was approved.

Pastor McPike thanked everyone for the opportunity to travel to other churches to preach and take time to travel with his wife. Pastor Frank will be preaching on September 28<sup>th</sup> and November 2<sup>nd</sup> at Immanuel Osman. Pastor McPike purchased a new curriculum for the teachers and students, as well as a catechism for each. Debbie Lammle will be teaching the Early Childhood class, including 3 students from ages 5-8. Pastor McPike will install a small computer which goes straight to the sound system so sermons can be recorded for the website. Pastor McPike will be preaching at his home church at Trinity Lutheran Church of Indianapolis, where he attended grade school through Grade 7.

In old business Jerry Niemann has a meeting scheduled for October 6<sup>th</sup> with an insurance agent in the area. An agent is scheduled to present to the council the pros and cons of each company-Church Mutual and Brotherhood Mutual. The fall festival was finalized with Jerry Niemann and Alicia Haggin leading the service and playing the keyboard on September 20<sup>th</sup>, at 4pm. The proposed schedule is hymn sing, hay rack ride, potluck dinner (with hot dogs provided), cookie decorating, ice cream and cookie judging, and prizes awarded. Elders will call the members to notify them of no church on September 21<sup>st</sup>. As stated in the "Outreach" committee ideas, the committee suggested making a church brochure. Ideas were given on what should be included in the brochure. Reformation Service/with German Style potluck and Pastor Appreciation scheduled for October 19<sup>th</sup> was planned. The Mahomet Fall Festival on October 4<sup>th</sup> was discussed. Chairman Lammle suggested, because of the time constraint and not having a brochure about our church ready to hand out, that we not participate in the Mahomet Festival this year but put it on the calendar for next year.

In new business it was announced that the property in Osman that had the fire has been sold. It was proposed that the church offer to help the new owner with the clean-up. A gift for Pastor for Pastor Appreciation was voted on. A new printer cartridge for the old copier in the annex has been located so the old printer now works as a backup. The church was reimbursed for the 800 copies that were made for the Danville Zone LWML Fall Rally that our church hosted. The Stewardship Committee presented three names for possible benefit recipients. After some discussion, Casey Thomas and family from Bellflower was selected.

The Mission "Outreach "Committee then joined the meeting. They are Brenda Edwards, Jane Poppe, and Diana Zimmerman. Jerry Niemann is also a member of the committee. After much discussion, it was agreed that the committee should proceed with the items printed in red on the attached document that was handed out. Discussion was also held concerning the elders bringing the offering up to be blessed during the service and ushering for communion. The committee also made recommendations for the church council which will be considered at future meetings. The meeting was adjourned followed by reciting the Lord's Prayer.

### **Osman Beautification**

On Wednesday, September 24, clean up of the property north of the church's parking lot started in a big way! The property has been purchased by an Osman resident. He is attempting to clean up the corner by recycling the metal in a dumpster and destroying the half burnt house. Dennis Martin was hired to help with the demolition with his heavy equipment. The old storage shed that belonged to the church that sat close to the property line was also included in the demolition. More landscaping and continual disposal of materials will be ongoing.
